Ms. Zere, who is president and owner of Zere Associates, demonstrated her pioneer spirit in 1980 when she established the only female owned commercial and industrial real estate firm on Long Island. At, the time, she was a single mom raising three children, ages 13, 12 and 9. She decided to research and learnt all she could about commercial real estate and get into the field, with the goal of helping both her own family and the family of man.

"I wanted to help mankind, and I thought I could do it better with money than without money; she recalled. Besides, she felt the commercial real estate field was an exciting one. "I wanted to keep my pulse on things and also get my shot at the golden ring."

She has forged a successful career as a leader in the industry. Her clients include major insurance companies, financial institutions and some of 'the large residential, commercial and industrial builders on Long Island. She is an outspoken proponent of doing business on Long Island, and has been very successful in bringing companies from as far away as Japan to establish businesses here.

She serves as the President of the Commercial Industrial Real Estate Society of Long Island. She is on the Board of Governors of the New York State of Realtors and is also a board member of Promote Long Island. She Is a co-founder of the Suffolk County Republican Woman and an active member of Long Island Mid-Suffolk Business Action (LIMBA), Long Island Builders Institute, and the Long Island Association. She has been the recipient of the Distinguished Achievement in the Field of Business award from the Town of Islip and has been honored by A Planned Program for Life Enrichment (APPLE). She has been instrumental in fund-raising efforts for the Lake Grove School.

While Ms. Zere lived for many years in a house with a geographically split personality – "I would wake up in the Town of Smithtown and eat breakfast in the Town of Brookhaven" – she now resides in the Village of the Branch with her husband, Fred Russo. She and Mr. Russo, a field engineer for Behring Diagnostic, have been married for a year and a half. Between them, they have seven children and six grandchildren. All three of Ms. Zere's children – Michael Paul Zere, David Wayne Zere and Michele Marie Zere, are real estate brokers. Her sons are partners in her firm while her daughter is the advertising director for Real Estate New York Magazine.

A golfer herself – "I'm not good but I love the game and I'm improving," she said – she is proud to be honored by the Girl Scouts at this event.
